CHARACTER TRAIT- GENEROSITY



Today I thought about how "we", FCE members, continue to promote & sustain our cultures, history of home skills & traditions and community leadership through sharing and generosity.

People have rich traditions of sharing and generosity which include gifting, shared meals, community gatherings, shared living spaces and care for relatives, the environment, natural resources and teaching others valuable life skills.

So, what does it mean to be a generous, sharing person?

Let's distinguish the difference. Giving vs. sharing.

Are we asking people to give? Or are we asking them to share? This might feel like a trivial choice of synonyms. It's not and I learned those skills through FCE.

Giving can be "arms-length," anonymous, and transactional. The giver and receiver are separated. The giver is higher. The receiver is lower. Giving helps "those people."

Sharing is different. Sharing helps "us." Each person is both giver and receiver. It's not equal. But it is reciprocal. It is mutual.

Sharing is communal. It means being part of a group, a partnership, a community. We can ask an outsider to give. But we can't ask an outsider to share. This means several things:

Sharing requires membership.
Sharing is visible to the community.
Sharing supports community goals.
Sharing follows community norms.

Generosity means willingness and liberality in giving away one's money, time, etc; magnanimity. freedom from pettiness in character and mind (webster).

Through our generosity as a group, we are able to donate time, money and valuable wisdom to sustain our rich history. Through continued traditions and educational craft and life skills classes we demonstrate how sharing is vital to the community; and how sharing turns into friendships; and those friendships then turn into generosity. May you know each small act we do as individual clubs fosters the generosity of the next generation.



LEFTOVER SOUP

LESSONS IN FOOD SECURITY

Variety in Vegetable Soups by Dora B. Haines

It has been said that the essence of economy is a good soup. We Americans waste a good deal of material that might be converted into most palatable and nourishing soups. The recipes which follow are given because the materials used are nearly always at hand in practically every household. With a little skill ordinary material may be converted into a most delicious soup.

To make a vegetable soup, the bone and scraps of meat left from a steak may be used for the stock or a 10-cent soup bone may be provided. This should be put on in a quart of cold water to which has been added a level teaspoonful of salt and cooked slowly for an hour and a half. Pare two or three good-sized potatoes and slice in the chopping bowl. Scrape one good-sized carrot and slice two mediumsized onions and a quarter of a small head of cabbage. Chop these all together until quite fine. Put these in the kettle with the meat and broth from it and cook, covered, over a very low flame at least an hour. Have soaked for three or four hours half a cupful of pearl barley. Add this to the kettle at the same time you do the vegetables. It will be necessary to add at least a pint of water, and possibly more, according peppercorns placed in the kettle with the meat give the soup a very distinct flavor. Some people use a bay leaf and a clove. The problem of seasoning is altogether a matter of individual taste.

Ingredients:

1-3 cups Bone and Meat from Beef, Turkey, or Chicken

10-12 cups water

1 teaspoon salt

3 russet potatoes, scrubbed & cubed

1/2 cups carrots (2 medium), peeled and chopped

1.5 cups onion, chopped

2 cups cabbage, chopped

1 cup pearled barley or grain of choice (quinoa, buckwheat or rice)

1 teaspoon whole peppercorns

additional seasoning: bay leaf, parsley, turmeric, clove or mace

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT




